





how to find your academic report

how to apply for a minor

Students enrolled in a four- or five-level program (with the exception of the Medical Radiation Sciences programs) are eligible to obtain a Minor in another subject area, provided that the subject area is not integral to the requirements of their degree program. At least 18 units must be completed at McMaster. Students who wish to receive a Minor must consult the appropriate department section of the calendar. McMaster also offers Interdisciplinary Minors and Thematic Areas.

To apply for a Minor, students must complete the Minor/Certificate Application in addition to their online Graduation Information Centre (GIC) application. The student's Faculty will verify that the requirements have been met and, if successful, the transcript will indicate that a Minor has been obtained. Minors cannot be revoked once approved.






how to graduate

After you complete all your required courses and your final grades have been posted in Mosaic, please apply to graduate using the steps:







The "Expected Graduation Term" is the term in which you began your last course. When applying to graduate it takes 6-8 weeks to be approved. Once approved it takes an additional 6-8 weeks to receive your certificate, diploma or Certificate of Professional Learning in the mail. Certificate of Completion will be emailed shortly after the approval process.







INTERNATIONAL STUDENT SERVICES (ISS)

International students are a valued part of the McMaster community. International Student Services (ISS) is a division of the **Student Success Centre** that provides services and programs for international undergraduate, graduate, visiting and exchange students at McMaster. As an international student, you have access to immigration advising, health insurance (UHIP) and one-on-one success coaching to help you adjust to life at McMaster and access valuable campus services. We also offer workshops, social programming and events to connect with other international students and support your transition to living in Canada.

REQUIREMENTS

Full time status as a student in the Faculty of Social Sciences is the same for both domestic and international students.

If your course load is below 60% for your program, you are **part-time**. If your course load is above 60%, you are **full time**. This translates to 3 courses, or 9 units, per semester. Students enrolled in 3 courses, or 9 units, per semester are full time.

International students should note that it is typically not advised to take only 3 courses as if for an unforeseen reason they should drop a course, they automatically become part-time students. This has the potential to affect their eligibility to work and in the future affect their eligibility for the Post-Graduation Work Permit Program (PGWP).
